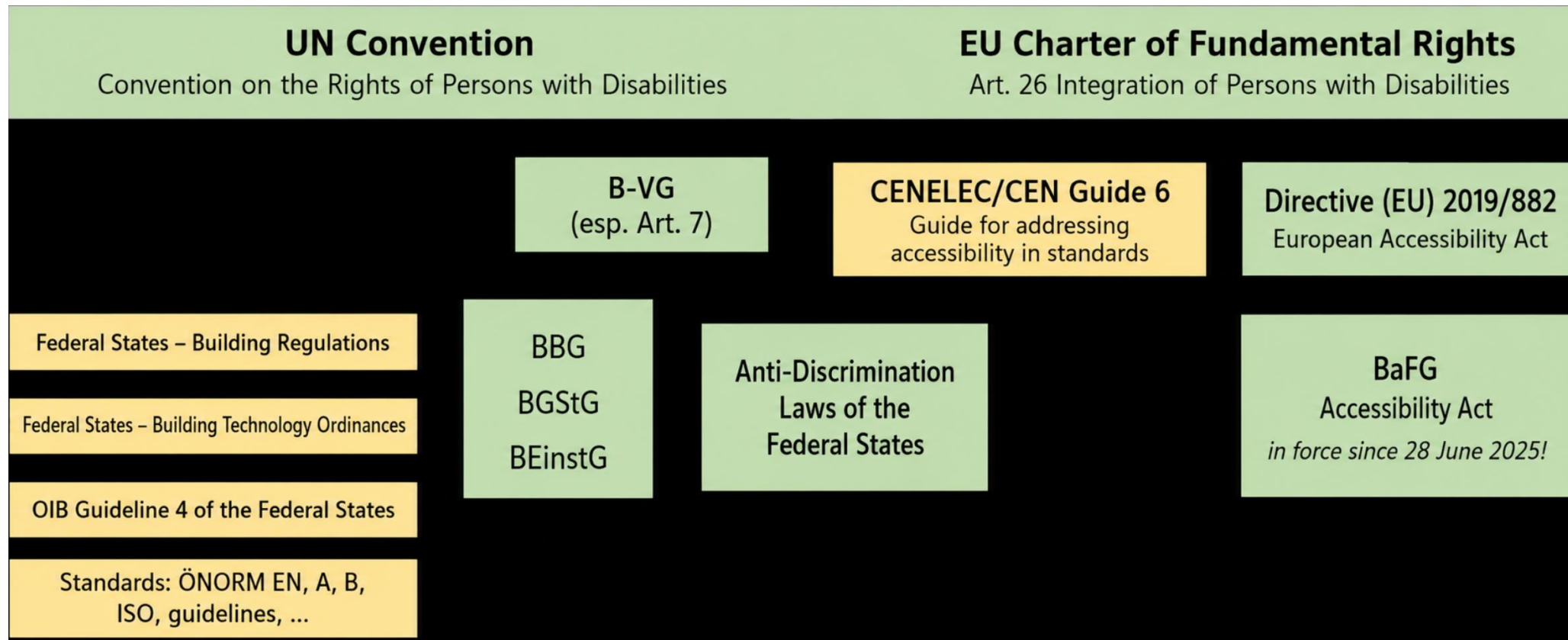

Legal foundations



Legal foundations

People with disabilities

...are people who have long-term physical, mental, intellectual or sensory impairments which, in interaction with various barriers, may hinder their full, effective and equal participation in society.

UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

People are disabled by barriers!

Differences from people without disabilities?

- ➡ NONE! People with disabilities want to go on holiday just like everyone else!

Goal – architectural accessibility

Accessible are buildings and other facilities, means of transport, technical commodities, information processing systems and other areas of life, when they are accessible and usable by people with disabilities in the customary way, without particular difficulty and generally without outside assistance.

Accessible according to BGStG §6 (5)

Requirements in tourism – causes of barriers

Distinction by type of disability

The cause of an **architectural barrier** is best explained **from the perspective of the people affected** and their disability:

- **Limited mobility**: wheelchair, walker, walking aids, etc.
- **Limited motor skills**: due to lack of muscle strength, fine motor skills and rapid exhaustion
- **Visual impairment, blindness**
- **Hearing impairment, deafness**

Requirements in tourism – types of barriers

Distinction by types of spatial and structural barriers

1. **Vertical barriers**: insurmountable height differences.
2. **Horizontal barriers**: structural conditions that make passage difficult.
3. **Spatial barriers**: limitation of room for movement.
4. **Ergonomic barriers**: limitations due to lack of fine motor skills and muscle strength.
5. **Anthropometric barriers**: limitations in reaching control elements.
6. **Sensory barriers**: sensory impairment of seeing, hearing and touch.

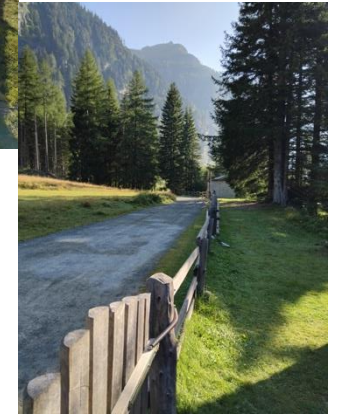
Requirements in tourism – local barriers

Where can local barriers occur?

1. **Accessibility in public spaces**: roads, sidewalks, paths, transport, accessible parking spaces for cars
2. **External access**: access to buildings: paths, ramps, stairs
3. **Internal access**: accessibility inside buildings: corridors, ramps, stairs, lifts, doors, passages
4. **Sanitary facilities**: accessible WC, other sanitary rooms and sanitary fixtures
5. **Fittings and furnishings**: clearance underneath furniture, turning circles, technical aids

Tourism offers

- Nature experiences
- Tourist infrastructure
Excursion destinations, adventure pools, museums, cable cars,
Leisure and adventure facilities, boat services
Zoo and animal experiences and scenic tourist roads
- Accommodation businesses
- Food and beverage establishments
- Congress and conference offers
- Shopping centres (currently pilot projects)



Accessibility criteria

The criteria for accessibility are defined in catalogues of criteria depending on the offer.

- Mandatory criteria - minimum standard
- Additional criteria – offer-dependent
- Optional criteria – higher standard

- Arrival
- Route to the infrastructure
- Outdoor areas / accessibility
- Outdoor area / access
- Entrance area/ticket desk/information
- Horizontal access
- Vertical access
- Sanitary facilities in public areas

Accessibility criteria

The criteria for accessibility are defined for specific areas.

- Accessibility of basic services (reception, restaurant, outdoor dining area)
- Gastronomy
- Accommodation / rooms
- Employee training

Accessibility criteria - arrival

- Public transport
- Individual transport
- Accessible parking spaces
- Ground conditions, gradients



Accessibility criteria – route to the infrastructure

- Ideal - gradient
- Ground conditions
- Steps, thresholds



Accessibility criteria – outdoor areas

- Connection between public and private property
- Entrance recognizable
- Entrance door (widths, marking)



Accessibility criteria – information

- Accessible ticket/cash desk area
- Operating heights
- Communication
multi-sensory principle



Accessibility criteria – horizontal access

- Doors
- Corridor widths
- Movement areas



Accessibility criteria – vertical access

- Stairs
- Ramps
- Passenger lifts



Accessibility criteria – sanitary facilities

General accessible sanitary facility is available

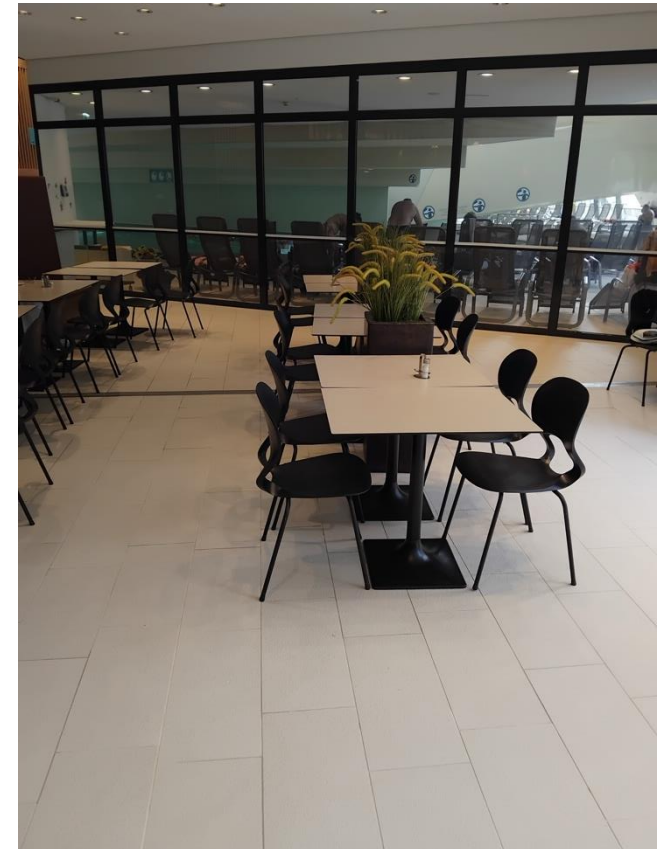
- Clear width **access** ≥ 80 cm
- **Room dimensions** ≥ 165 cm x 215 cm OR
at least a clear turning circle ≥ 150 cm is available
- **Frontal approach** in front of the WC seat of 120 cm is available
- **Side approach** of ≥ 90 cm is available on at least one side.
Washbasin/handwash basin designed to allow wheelchair access underneath
- **Grab rails on both sides** of the WC seat are available
- **Emergency call**: must be operable from the WC while seated and from the floor while lying down at 35 cm above FFL
- **WC seat with backrest** and without lid is provided

Accessibility criteria – sanitary facilities



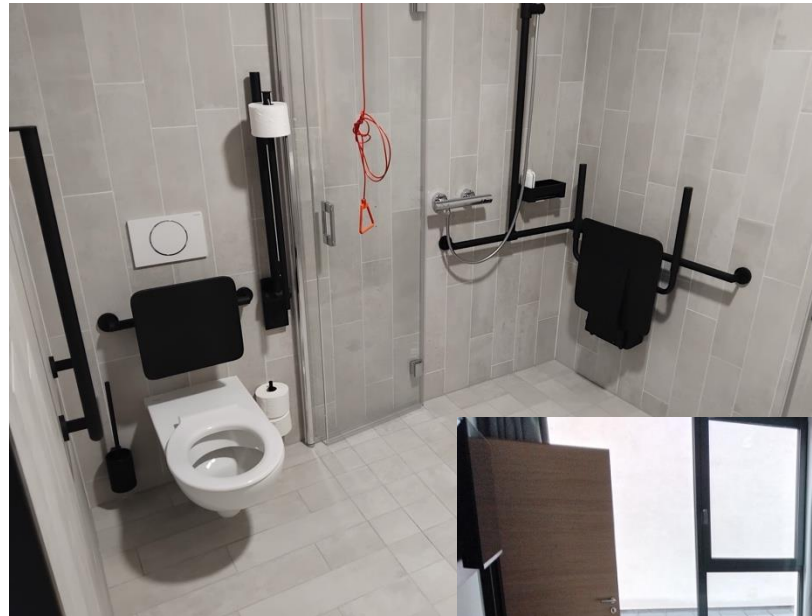
Accessibility criteria – gastronomy

- Access routes
- Tables accessible underneath
- Accessible buffet
- Information using the multi-sensory principle



Accessibility criteria – guest rooms

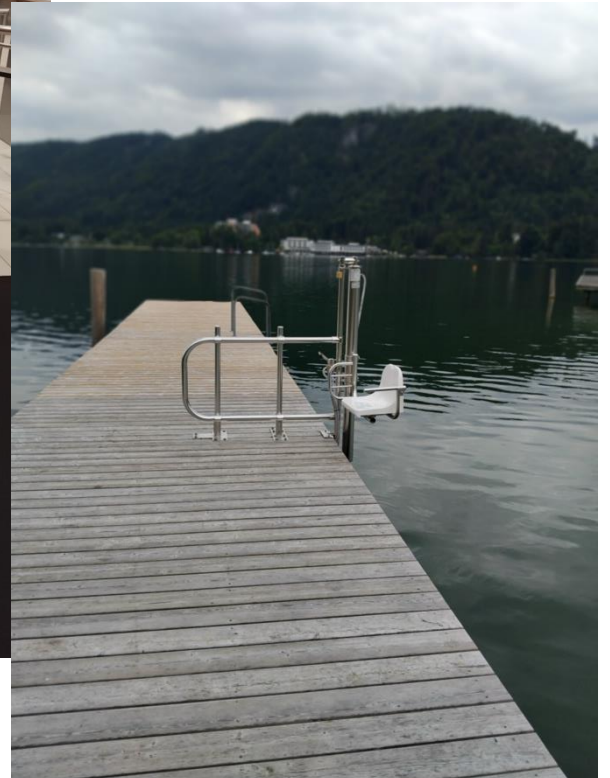
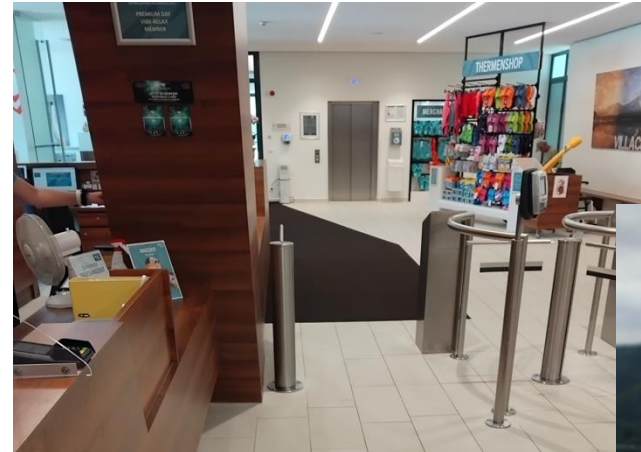
- Movement areas

Additional accessibility criteria – examples

Adventure pools

- Accessible access controls
- Changing rooms
- Shower area
- Pool hoist
- Contrasts
- Wellness/Sauna



Additional accessibility criteria – examples

Museums

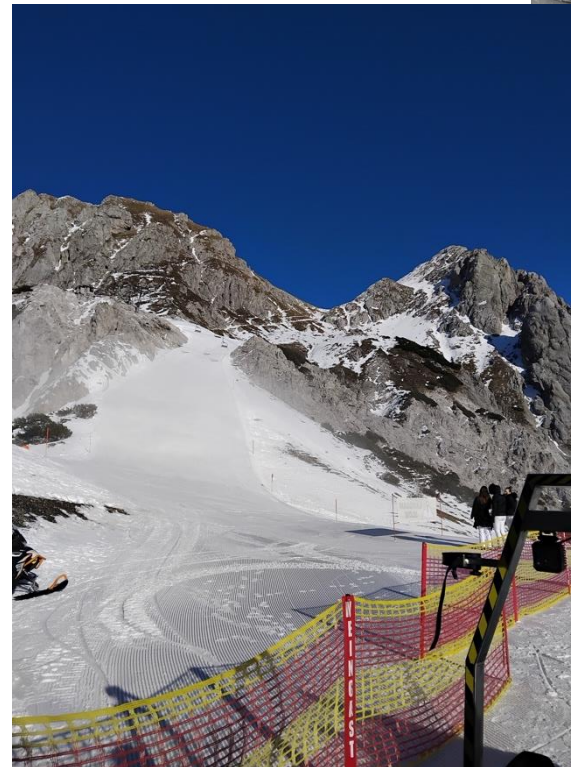
- Exhibits accessible and experienceable without steps or thresholds - sightlines
- Information on key exhibits using the multi-sensory principle (e.g. plain text, tactile information, audio information...)
- Special exhibits are offered in tactile form (originals or replicas)



Additional accessibility criteria – examples

Cable cars

- Accessible access controls
- Staff assistance
- Boarding contrasts
- Slow-speed function
- Gondola dimensions
